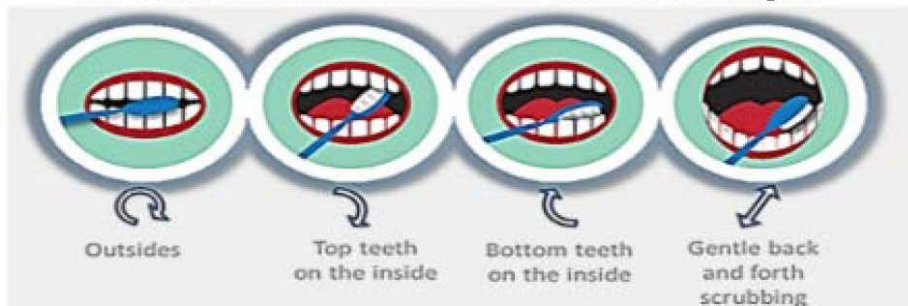

30th WOODENBONG TRAIL RIDE: May 2019

Well the crowds have dispersed and we are finally getting back to our quiet life as we reflect on a very successful weekend- Perhaps the best one yet. May was definitely a very busy month for Woodenbong this year. The visitors descended as usual on the Friday and quickly filled the grounds. This time they also camped in half of the arena. It was great to see some old friends who have not made it to recent rides. Our volunteers were busy cleaning-setting up-delivering and cooking, peeling and slicing. Signs on the road at Rathdowney said "WOODENBONG RIDE FULL"

All the usual attractions- Band, Jumping castle, Bar, Trade stalls. Jack Field and Rhianna Buchanan brought the FLAIR ACTION RIDERS for an amazing show. Jack had to be in Melbourne the next day- he set a new world record- the worlds highest back flip on a motor bike on top of the highest building in Melbourne. He already holds the record for the world's lowest. On Tuesday morning he was on the "Sunrise" show talking about the stunt!!

The fireworks were incredible. Everyone said they were the best ever. We are so privileged to have such a world class company come here and give us a show that everyone can enjoy. A generous owner of an automotive paint company donated a whole box of merchandise to raffle- we raffled the items for the helicopter rescue. The Students going to Jindabyne ran the BBQ and Danny Dickens gave massages in the massage tent. Fire drums kept everyone warm and the weather was co-operating, for once.

Everything was going to plan until Pam hurt her back on Thursday afternoon and soldered on through until Saturday night when the pain became unbearable and she had to retire to bed- she has been recovering ever since. So everyone in the kitchen had to step up and fill her amazing shoes. Lynne and Jim Parker also had medical issues which saw them in hospital and were unable to help with the coffee van, plumbing, cleaning and all the other many tasks they do. We wish all three a speedy and full recovery. The federal election also caused some problems with many people having to work on polling booths instead of coming/helping at the ride.

The Killarney boys who came again this year and were "sweeps" did a wonderful job and we really appreciated their attention to detail. The now famous, "Woodenbong Yowie" made an appearance on a mini bike, dressed in a sweeps fluoro vest and entertained everyone at riders briefing. He was a big

hit with the kids (maybe it was the lollies he gave out courtesy of Mitre 10) A big thank you to all our amazing helpers who have been the backbone of this event since we started 15 years ago. Especially those behind the scenes and who are not always evident. The people who cook the roasts, slice the onions, peel the carrots, cook the vegetables, clean the toilets, collect items from the shops, The RFS, and much more. You are the ones who make everything happen.

Unfortunately this year we had a very sad event. On Saturday afternoon one of our riders suffered a severe medical condition whilst out riding with his mates and he was unable to be revived. Justin Flowers was 50 years old and has attended many Woodenbong rides. His wife and daughter were also at the ride along with other family members and employees. Everyone in Woodenbong would like to offer their thoughts and prayers to his friends and family. I would also like to personally thank the Ambulance, SES, Police and the Medic for their professionalism, empathy and quick responses. Also thank you to the other riders, sweeps and anyone else involved in the event.

This year our camping fees were just under \$10,000 for the showground trust, \$1000 to the Woodenbong Fire Brigade, \$500 to the Common Trust and approximately \$5000 to the Community account for catering. Other profits included a raffle- Helicopter rescue, Pre-School \$300 WCS students fundraiser BBQ, and Souvenir sales to WPA

After such a wonderfully successful weekend the Progress association was very disappointed to receive the follow letter from Ray Buchanan which was presented at the monthly meeting last week. The amount of money, connections, friendships and publicity created from the last 30 events has been astounding but not as amazing as the fact that people from all walks of life and backgrounds have all worked together to put Woodenbong on the map.

The event is WOODENBONG TRAIL RIDE and as hard as we work and despite the thousands of hours we volunteer we cannot alter the fact, that without somewhere to ride the event cannot continue. Dear Christine,

What an event the 30th running of the Woodenbong Trail Ride turned out to be! With very little rain since the beginning of the year, the ride was looking like being a very dusty affair, however in the week leading up to the event showers and light rain fell every night to make riding conditions as good as it gets for this type of events.

On top of great riding conditions and awesome tracks that had all the riders raving, the *All Fired Up* fireworks team once again excelled with a pyrotechnics display that simply blew everyone away. The rain even held off until midnight to make sure the tracks were prime for Sunday's ride.

The support of the Woodenbong landowners and community has been a major key to the ongoing success of the Woodenbong Trail Ride and those people concerned are to be congratulated on their support, consideration and input into making these rides viable.

A 2008 *Queensland Government Sport and Recreation Case Study* of the event estimated that the Woodenbong Trail Ride injected \$50,000 into the community each time it was held. That means well over \$1.5 million has been injected into the community as a direct result of the Woodenbong Trail Rides over the past 30 events!

In addition to this are community benefit activities directly funded by ADBA (approx costs):

- \$200,000 for community firework displays;
- \$25,000 for live music entertainment (Bands);
- \$32,000 for live special interest entertainment (Freestyle Motocross etc); and
- \$23,000 for children's entertainment.

Riders have often spoken to me on the improvements to the Showgrounds and the facilities. My reply is always that they have helped to make those improvements possible.

Unfortunately, several factors are combining to make planning and delivering future Woodenbong Trail Rides untenable.

The first of these could be called "progress". Woodenbong's tree plantations, which make for the great riding for which Woodenbong is noted, are fast disappearing. These properties are being reverted to grazing land. Along with that are landowners who are

resistant to allowing bikes to pass through their blocks to provide access to Forestry and other suitable riding areas.

The second factor relates to Forestry NSW. As Forestry no longer maintain the fire brakes and logging trails, it has become increasingly time consuming and expensive for me to reopen these trails almost every time an event is run. I have tried unsuccessfully for a number of years to have the Forestry fees that I legally must pay waived in return for keeping these trails open, but Forestry seems addicted to the money I contribute to their coffers.

The third factor is the increasing amount of red tape and associated fees for development assessments (DA's) and insurance permits which are a legal requirement to run a trail ride. Liaising with two local authorities to navigate their challenging requirements to gain permission to legally hold these rides is taking its toll. Trails must be identified and approved by the DA process and applications for DA must be lodged 6 months in advance of the ride date. Variations incur additional costs. For example, the cost (which I had to absorb) of DA compliance just to change last year's ride date from October to November was \$500 - I did not realise ink was so expensive!

Additionally, Motorcycling NSW have increased rider levies and permit fees which cover event insurance. All these added costs can only be sustained by raising the entry fee or cutting costs on the Saturday night entertainment that the Woodenbong Trail Ride has now become famous for! I could not imagine the Woodenbong Trail Ride without the fireworks!! Driving forces for the provision of entertainment at the events was to 1. Encourage the locals to come and be part of the event; and 2. Provide a way that the riders could give back to the Woodenbong community.

I have managed to cope with the red tape and bureaucratic issues to date but these are becoming more difficult and making future planning increasingly difficult.

As they say, "All good things must come to an end", and it would seem that this may be the case for the Woodenbong Trail Rides. The increasing costs and uncertainty surrounding the ability to pre-plan trails for the rides makes this part of the process almost impossible. Landowner reluctance to provide access, combined with the two Council's DA requirement for information six months prior the each event means that planning ahead has become unachievable.

If commitment to land access can be confirmed before the end of July, I would certainly review the situation, however, without this confirmation I am sorry to say that, with the current inability to effectively plan ahead, it will not be possible to run an October ride this year. I truly hope that the old adage "You don't know what you've got until it's gone" does not come to pass for the Woodenbong Community.

I whole-heartedly acknowledge and thank the farmers and community of Woodenbong for their support and friendship over the last 15 years that the Woodenbong Trail Rides have been running.

Our older folk are real gems and it's so important for us to show them value and love and to hear their stories before they leave us!

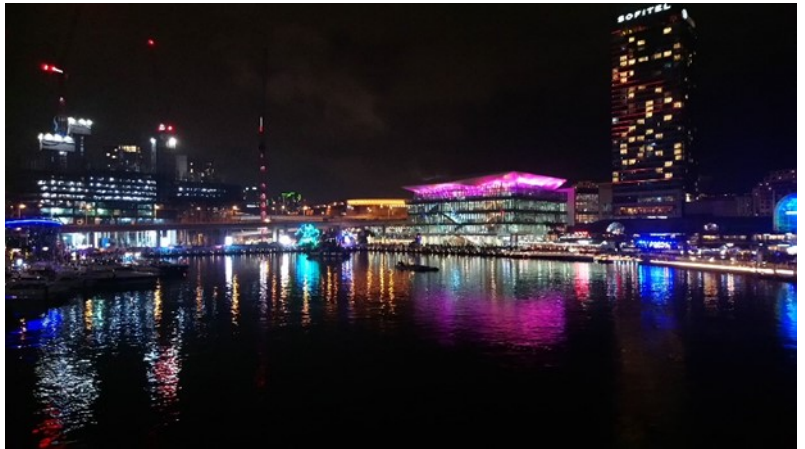
How much "thinner" do we feel as a community, as our precious oldies take their leave.

YEAR 12 GEOGRAPHY (AND ANCIENT HISTORY) IN SYDNEY

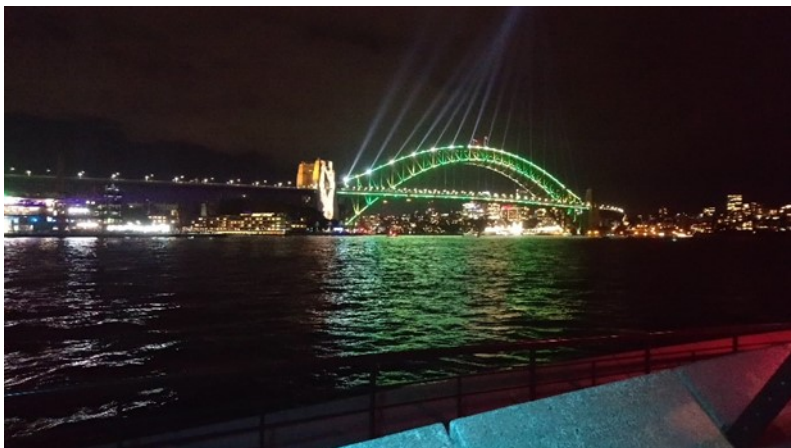
At the end of Week 6 – and into their long weekend – the Year 12 Geography students travelled down to Sydney to conduct fieldwork on some of the case studies they will be using in their upcoming HSC examinations.



After Erin and Jess survived the drama of a pretty turbulent flight and an underground train trip, we made it to our accommodation at the BIG Hostel Surry Hills. We dumped our gear, then once again braved public transport for the long (and quite entertaining) bus trip out to Bondi Beach to look at how different the beach-side suburbs are from the inner city. We took a long walk around the area to see the different types of housing, before catching a bus back to the hostel (during peak hour traffic). After getting more warm clothes, we headed down to Circular Quay to see how the Vivid lightshows draw tourists into the centre of Sydney, as it is showcased as a World City. The lightshow was pretty spectacular, and we headed up into the historic area of The Rocks for the night markets and a vast array of cuisine from different cultures, as we saw the multicultural nature of modern Sydney.

The next day, Jess and I headed to the University of Sydney to attend the Ancient History Study Day hosted by the HTANSW, while the others and Mrs Amos enjoyed a sleep-in... The lectures provided Jess with expert insights into the topics she is studying for the HSC, and the resources will be invaluable in her upcoming preparations. We also had a quick look through the Nicolson Museum at Sydney Uni, which had a selection of artefacts and displays from around the world – including a LEGO Pompeii! The weather wasn't kind to us, and it was wet and quite cold, but we walked from Sydney Uni to meet the others at the White Rabbit Gallery. Here Billie was able to view a range of exhibits from contemporary Chinese artists, hopefully giving her ideas and insights for her upcoming Visual Arts major work. As the weather cleared a bit in the evening we went down to Tumbalong Park and Darling Harbour, to see how this part of Sydney has been transformed from a neglected port area into a public space, with tourist facilities and great views of the city.

On Saturday, we walked from our accommodation all the way into Redfern for Jess and Billie to experience the suburb they are using for their case study. We got to see the area formerly known as 'The Block', which is currently fenced off and awaiting a multi-million dollar redevelopment, and the old terrace houses throughout the suburb. This was contrasted with the influx of cafes, coffee houses, and trendy bars catering for the new affluent residents of the suburb. We even saw Redfern Oval, now the training base of the South Sydney Rabbitohs, and saw some of the Rabbitohs and Knights' Under 21's sides preparing for their game. We then took a train back into Wynyard for the walk to The



Rocks for a look at Erin's case study. We saw how The Rocks is being effected by the new Barangaroo development, as a new suburb emerges from the harbour in front of the old terrace houses. We had a brief lunch stop in one of the new eateries at Barangaroo, before catching a ferry out to Drummoyne. This gave students the chance to see the waterfront suburbs both sides of the harbour, and how the wealthy live in Sydney. In Drummoyne we walked to Birkenhead Point – an outlet shopping centre that has emerged from a converted warehouse on the harbour – in an example of the gentrification that is characterising the inner suburbs of Sydney.

We all had an early night, as the students were all exhausted from the excessive walking I had made them do for 3 days. According to Jess' phone, we averaged between 10 and 15km each day, which wasn't a bad effort. This was followed by a VERY early wake-up on Sunday morning to catch our flight home.

I would like to thank the students for the mature and responsible way they conducted themselves, as it made my job very easy during the trip. I would also like to thank Mrs Amos for her help in accompanying the excursion and providing supervision for the students – especially while Jess and I were at the Study Day. I would also like to thank Billie for the numerous ways she managed to entertain us all. Feel free to ask her to tell any of the following stories about her trip:

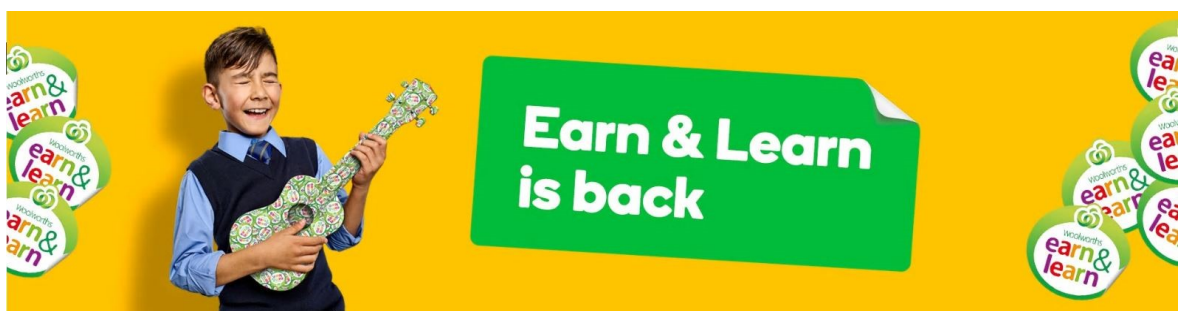
As this is my last excursion with WCS students, I couldn't think of a better trip to end on, so thank you again for making this trip possible, and for all the memories from past excursions...
